



 Practise the Year 3/4 for <u>Common Exception</u> words. Practise your spelling on Spelling Frame. This week our focus is <u>Spelling Rule 18</u> Words with the /s/ sound spelt sc e.g. science, ascent and scene. Make sure you click on to <u>Spelling Tiles</u> the <u>FREE</u> game. Try using <u>spellzone</u> to use free interactive games to help you with this spelling rule. You can also try rainbow writing where you writing out the word several times in different coloured pens. This will help you remember how the word is spelt. 	 Watch the clip of <u>Hugh</u> based on an Apache myth, retell the story orally and answer the questions. Read and analyse the modelled text. Underline or highlight the fronted adverbials, noun phrases, prepositions and dialogue. Using a range of fronted adverbials for where, when and how. Write down 3 or more sentences to describe each picture. Plan your own myth of how a change has happened. Write your own myth, you will need to include fronted adverbials, noun phrases and prepositions. Use the word bank and your plan to help you write your story.

Our	CREATE	Draw or create a <u>dreamcatcher</u> . Dream catchers were designed to catch evil spirits before they could enter your dreams. They were made with an open weave so the good dreams could get through.	
R	RESEARCH	Research about the <u>Native American History</u> and find out how the Native Americans got their food.	
E	Explore	Explore the <u>Iroquois Tribe</u> and explain why they were significant in Native American history.	
A	design	Discover one of the most famous statues in the USA. Recreate the <u>Statue of Liberty</u> using a range of resources at home. You may want to use cardboard, plastic bottles or even <u>play</u> dough.	
Т	TUNE	Tune in and listen to <u>American Native</u> music. Write down what instruments you can hear in the music. You may want to create your own rhythm by clapping with the music.	
I	Alicto	Using PowerPoint, create a slideshow of all the information you have learnt about Native American history.
