The children really enjoyed their science experiment to celebrate **British Science Week** on Thursday. There was a lovely enthusiastic buzz around school as








Wowsers! Thornton children have again being excellent sports ambassadors. A **mixed football team of Year 4, 5 and 6**




Year 4

Dinner money must be paid in advance and is £2.40 per day and £12.00 per week.


Breakfast Club must be paid in advance and is £1 per day and 50p for any siblings.
