Look: first look at the whole word carefully.

Say: say the word as you look at it, using different ways of pronouncing it if that will make it more memorable.

Cover: cover the word with your hand.

Write: write the word from memory, saying the word as you do so.

Check: Have you got it right? If yes, try writing it again and again! If not, start again - look, say, cover, write, check.



# Present New Information:





# Present New Information:

**Plural** means more than one of something. When there is one of something, this is known as singular.



**Possessive** in this case means to show the possession and relationship between two nouns.

If we have more than one object, we place an s at the end: one shoe becomes two shoes.

When we show possession, we place an apostrophe and an s: the shoes of the girl become the girl's shoes.

needing an apostrophe.

# Review:

When we talk about grammar, we are talking about the structure that we give the language we use and the rules that it follows to make sure what we say makes sense, is logical and is clear.

Some examples are:

- Which nouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs and prepositions make sense in a sentence;
- When to use was / were, there / their / they're, or a / an.
- Show to add prefixes and suffixes to show tense or change meaning.
