

performer who emphasizes the spoken word. Although her poetry hits hard in addressing contemporary themes, it often makes use of formal constraints, including traditional poetic forms. She has described herself as "bicultural".

Issues of racial and gender identity feature in her poetry. She is celebrated "for paying equal homage to literature and performance" and for work that "moves fluidly and nimbly between cultures, dialects, voices; between page and stage." In 2017, she was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature.


see my jaw dropping neat Anglo-Saxon, I got ink in my veins more than Caxton and it flows hand to mouth, here's a mouthfeast, verbal feats from the streets of the South-East but my April, she blooms every shire's end, fit or vint, rich or skint, she inspires them from the grime to the clean-cut iambic, rime royale, rant or rap, get your slam kick on this Routemaster bus: get cerebral, Tabard Inn to Canterbury Cathedral, poet pilgrims competing for free picks, Chaucer Tales, track by track, here's the remix from below-the-belt base to the topnotch; I won't stop all the clocks with a stopwatch when the tales overrun, run offensive, or run clean out of steam, they're authentic cos we're keeping it real, reminisce this: Chaucer Tales were an unfinished business.

Patience's first children's fiction books include people who can travel through time. This leads to weird events where people can send warning letters from the future to change the past. The lead character, Elle, is neuro divergent with ASC.













Would you recommend that everyone learns poetry by heart and why?

#### Patience

Definitely. Because it's fun and gives you confidence and instils a deep love of language and literature. And it also enables a reaching out to community. People generally learn poems so they can share them. They might savour them on their own tongue and lips but there is also a pure joy in lighting up someone's life with a poem. The key thing is, it must be a poem that's been chosen, not imposed. When someone chooses a poem, they choose it because it speaks to them. Even the process of finding such a poem is like finding a jewel, a linguistic gem that must be celebrated. I also think there's something infectious about learning poetry by heart. When you see other people doing it, as I did, all those years ago in my early 20s, I wanted to do it too.
