## **Blabbering Blurbs**

Read the blurb on the back cover. Does it mention anything that hasn't happened yet in the book? Does it imply that something is about to happen? Copycats

Think about other stories you have read in the past. Could something similar happen in this one?

## **Read Between the Lines**


Sometimes, it isn't what is being said, it's what isn't being said that counts. Are the characters hinting at something? Have they done something that might lead to something else happening?

## Activity 2

## KS2: Predict what might happen from details stated and implied


This can be as simple as asking the question, 'What do you think is going to happen next?' quickly followed with, 'Why?'. However, we need to make explicit the additional skills needed to be able to do this. To be able to predict, you need to be able to read and understand what has happened, and is currently happening. You need to be able to retrieve and infer ('details stated and implied'), combine this with your knowledge of the world (use your prior knowledge), weigh up probability, and make a sensible prediction of the next outcome.
