

Hello everyone

Last week, Mrs Biddle-Rawbone and I were honoured to be invited by Nadia Ahmed, Community Development Manager, to attend the **Ward End Asian Elders Wellbeing Association's** (WEAEWA) celebration ceremony. It was great to be part of a community event that recognised the achievements of local women. Awards were presented for successfully completing fitness and IT skills programmes. We were really excited by the vision that was shared for the future of this valuable community resource and will tell you more about it soon!

Yesterday, we were lucky to have the Asthma Nurse from Washwood Heath Wellbeing Centre, Teresa, visit school. She talked with parents about asthma care and we want to share some of the important points she made with you:

- Preventative inhalers (usually brown or purple) must be used with a spacer in the morning and in the evening to have maximum effect, not just when feeling wheezy
- Volumatic spacers (the large, clear ones) should be used and not aero chamber face masks (the yellow ones that cover the nose) so the medication goes straight to the lungs where it is needed most and not up the nose!
- If you have a concern about asthma, ask your GP to refer you to the asthma nurse



Asthma UK have a brilliant website which helps explain how best to care for asthmatics and even has videos about how to use an inhaler properly and effectively - www.asthma.org.uk



We investigated the steps involved in mummifying bodies during Ancient Egyptian times and we also used clay to form images of canopic jars and pyramids. Mr Ryall kindly provided us with the chance to look at a cranial crochet hook similar to the one on display in the Science Museum in London. The Ancient Egyptians used this hook to remove the brain before mummification!




Year 4

Importance of Reading in enhancing your critical and analytical thinking




