Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

Focus of the week: Area and perimeter

 On <u>MyMaths</u> you will find your child has been set 5 tasks this week on <u>area and perimeter</u>. Can you



encourage them to complete one a day? There are video tutorials and lessons for your child to watch and follow before completing each

activity.

- Encourage your child to work on their reasoning skills by completing the questions on <u>area and</u> <u>perimeter</u> (see sheet below). The questions get gradually harder so try and get them to challenge themselves! The answers have been provided so that your child can check their work.
- If you would like to practise drawing quadrilaterals and looking at their area/perimeter, try this <u>site</u>.
 You can further challenge yourself with this <u>game</u>.
- Click on the words if you need some more guidance: <u>area</u>, <u>perimeter</u>.
- <u>Times Tables Rock Stars</u> this provides a carefully sequenced programme of daily timetables practice.



Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

Reading focus of the week: Predictions

- Read with your child, and ask them to predict what might have happen before the story, or what might happen next. The predictions should be based on facts that they have been given.
- Activity 1 This week, we will be working through another Talk for Writing booklet (<u>Doors</u>). The booklet has a range of reading and writing activities and this will contribute towards this week's reading tasks.
- Activity 2 Read through <u>Chapter 2</u> (pages 18-30) of Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone, and have a go at these <u>activities!</u> One of the activities includes making a prediction on what will happen next.
 - If you would like to listen to the chapter, you can if you create an account with this <u>website</u>. Alternatively, you can listen to it on Spotify, if you have an account.
- Your child can log on to <u>Reading Plus</u> and complete 2 reading activities and 2 vocabulary activities, as a minimum, each week.

Weekly Spelling Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

Spelling focus: /i:/ sound spelt ei after c

- Activity 1: Have a go at playing some of these games. Look at the words: deceive, conceive, receive, perceive, ceiling, conceit, receipt, deceit. Look up their meanings, and write some sentences.
- Activity 2: Once you have practised with the words above, and played some of the games, you can further practise and test yourself by clicking on the Practice/Test button on this website.

Strategies you could use:

Remember, sometimes you have to learn spelling patterns. There are always exceptions to the rule however. For this particular one, just make sense of the sound i(eye), after the letter c. I was always taught: ' *i before e, except after c*'.

Weekly Writing Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

Writing genre for this week: Story writing

- This week the writing genre is story writing. You can look at this <u>link</u> if you need support.
- Task This week, we will be working through another Talk for Writing booklet (<u>Doors</u>). The booklet has a range of reading and writing activities and this will contribute towards this week's writing tasks.
- Writing Challenge Delve further into the world of idioms by playing this game, and then complete this task.
- Your child can access grammar, punctuation and spelling activities on the sheet below. The answers have been provided, so that your child can check their own work. The grammar focus is determiners and for a challenge it is word groups/families.



Creative homework- choose different elements to complete throughout the week

Creative homework aims to provide opportunities for your child to gain a better understanding of the new topic they are studying. Learning may focus on the different areas of the curriculum and provide your child with the

flexibility to lead their own learning. They are in control of the direction they wish to follow on their journey to make new and exciting discoveries.

Henri Rousseau was a French painter from the 19th Century who created many paintings inspired by jungles and rainforests, although he never actually visited one. Direct your child to explore <u>facts</u> about this famous painter and encourage them to create a jungle/rainforest piece of <u>artwork in his style</u>. They could draw, paint or create a collage, depending on the resources you have available at home.

The BBC programme <u>Blue Planet 2</u> sparked an outcry about the health of our oceans and the huge threat caused by plastics, but lots of people around the world are working hard to help solve this problem. Direct your child to read about <u>Madison Edwards</u>, a 12 year old environmental activist. Encourage them to do their bit to help preserve our oceans by asking them to keep a '<u>plastic diary</u>' recording how much single-use plastic the family uses. Ask them to <u>write down one thing</u> that the family will do to use less plastic.
