These can be people with official job titles or not! We described the things that people do around us that make things better for everyone.
















Year 6

In Year 6, as part of our topic on **Victorians**, we have been looking at the UN Conventions on the Rights of the Child. The children first analysed a passionate speech by Greta Thurnberg, and this inspired them to write their own. Before they could craft their speech, the children took part in a mind map rotation exercise, sharing the facts they had collated from a range of sources. They were shocked by the way the poor Victorian children were treated and this spurred



them to write a very passionate speech of their own. The purpose of their speech was to persuade the politicians to put an end to child labour and to protect the rights of the child. The children had already explored the meaning of a range of vocabulary linked to the UN Conventions on the Rights of the Child during their Shared Reading lessons. They were able to state that the politicians are Duty Bearers and that the children are Right Holders. Their speeches certainly made us sit up and listen! Here are some fantastic examples. Our Year 6 children have certainly shown us that they have a voice and that they want others to listen to their opinions!
