Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

Working on <u>Times Table</u> <u>Rockstars</u> - using your individual login to access this



- Worksheets on <u>MyMaths</u> there will be 5 a week so you can aim to do 1 a day. This week's focus is **fractions**
- Play on this <u>Maths Frame</u> game Find fractions of numbers and throw your pickaxe at the correct answer.
- Watch <u>Maths of the Day</u> to help you understand finding unit fractions
- Play this game on <u>Top marks</u> You need to match the fractions in either pictures or numerals.

Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Watch the videos of Miss
 Brown reading a chapter a day
 of Mother Knows Best on
 Thornton Primary School
 website.
- Watch the short film Home sweet home. Can you infer how Blue was feeling throughout the film?
- Do you think that the houses have different personalities? How do you know?



 In a book you have read, identify simple vocabulary. Then use a <u>thesaurus</u> to find <u>synonyms</u> to improve the vocabulary.

Weekly Spelling Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Practise <u>rule</u> 1 for spelling words by adding suffixes beginning with vowel letters to words of more than one syllable.
- Play this game on <u>Spelling Frame</u> to help you learn your spellings, then complete the spelling activities.



Spell words out loud, or have someone else do it for you. Sing the letters and listen to the rhythm, and you may sense the rules behind them. Teach someone else.

Try using a keyboard to type out your spellings. Seeing what you just typed appearing neatly on the screen may trigger your "right/wrong" sensors more reliably than trying to read your handwriting.



You could play 'spelling bingo' with a sibling or parent. Choose 4 words each and put them on a grid. Make tiles with each spelling on.

Turn them upside down and take it in turns picking them. Shout bingo when you have crossed them all off.

Weekly Writing Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

 Watch the short film <u>Home sweet</u> <u>home</u> again. How does Blue first meet Pet



Kennel? How do you think he felt about this? How does Pet Kennel behave? Write a list of things that Pet Kennel does.

- Write 5 adjectives to describe how Blue felt and then write them into sentences.
- Write a set of <u>instructions</u> about how to look after a Pet Kennel. Think carefully about how you would need to look after a pet.
- In your instructions you will need to have a clear layout, a 'You will need' list which explains what tools or ingredients will be required, numbered points, <u>'imperative verbs'</u> (bossy verbs) and <u>time connectives</u>.
- Throughout the short film we see Blue, Garage and Pet Kennel going on a journey through some beautiful places. Write a short description of one of these beautiful places. Use a range of <u>adjectives</u>. You can also use a thesaurus to help find

synonyms to improve your vocabulary.


