

Hello everyone

Further to a very impressive letter written by one of our Year 6 children last year, Zimal, we were delighted to welcome Liam Byrne MP for Hodge Hill to school this morning. The School Councillors had prepared well for their meeting and were extremely keen to ask a wide range of questions, such as what funding is available to us to help further develop our school allotment project! They also asked about ways the local government were tackling littering, and helping with regular bulky item collections, as well as asking about wider national and global issues such COP26 (The 26th United National Climate Change Conference of the Parties) and HS2 (High Speed 2). Thank you to everyone who managed to attend our **second outdoor parents' coffee morning**. We talked about the support the school provides to the children to promote positive mental health and the signposting to additional resources that can be found on the school website. 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YEAR 3

In Year 3, our new topic for Science is *Animals, including Humans*. We started off the half term seeing what the children already knew about our own bodies. We talked about internal and external body parts and the children had to label each other with all the parts of the body they knew! They had great fun doing it and had so many body parts for both internal and external! Well done Year 3!





YEAR 4

Year 4, started their new topic 'Burps, Bottoms and Bile' with a gruesome experiment to learn how the human digest system works! We worked collaboratively to replicate what happens when we eat food. We began by crushing crackers and bananas with some water which acted as the saliva. When the food entered our stomach, we added some orange juice, which acted as the stomach acid. After, the food

carried on its journey into the large intestine, which we used a pair of tights to replicate this. Finally, we learnt what happens when our body needs to get rid of waste.

To kick start Year 5's new theme - **Stargazers**, they created some amazing artwork of some of the celestial bodies in our Solar System. They used black paper and chalk to make this. They learnt that the best way to draw realistic looking stars twinkling in the night sky, they only needed to draw + and X signs with white chalk and then carefully smudge them. It was then completed by using a paint brush to flick white paint onto the background of the picture to create stars in the distance. To prevent the completed work from getting smeared, it was then carefully sealed with a spray sealant by an adult. Here are some examples of work from across the year group.

We think they are...OUT OF THIS WORLD! Why not have a go yourself?






Year 6

Wow! We currently have 366 children who have 97% and above attendance!




The Magic 20 Raising Attendance and Punctuality Project

In order to work in partnership with parents, we will be introducing 'The Magic 20 Raising Attendance and Punctuality Project' in the Autumn Term 2. This project is targeted at children with attendance below 90% and the main aim is to reward them for the achievement of attending school every day. It is a fact that children are much happier and settled if they attend school every day consistently without taking any days off.

Our reward system helps raise attendance and encourages children to achieve the school target of 97% by attending every day. This is how The Magic 20 Raising Attendance project works: -

- Your child will need to attend school for 20 consecutive school days without any absences during the Autumn 2 Term.
- Your child will need to have good punctuality, arriving between 8:30am and 8:45am, and no late marks for 20 days.

To celebrate your child's improved attendance they will be awarded a certificate and a small prize.
